

About ORCA's Accreditation Program

ORCA's Accreditation Program was introduced in 1995. A retirement residence is required to meet the Association's standards in order to become an approved ORCA member. Upon application to the Association, the retirement residence is considered an "applicant".

"Applicants" are provided with the following material to assist with preparing for evaluation:

- Comprehensive Operations Manual & CD
- Standards Guidelines
- Survey Tool (Assessment document used by Surveyors)
- Standards Policy and Procedure Manual
- Resource Guides

The retirement residence has six months to prepare for an on-site evaluation. Retirement residences under construction will be evaluated one year after opening. A retirement residence must successfully complete the evaluation in order to receive membership approval.

Trained surveyors conduct the on-site inspections. Survey results are graded by an independent third-party company. An "approved" retirement residence is re-surveyed on a regular basis to ensure compliance. A retirement residence that fails a survey by not meeting the Association standards is refused membership.
